## DR. TEED HAS NOT RISEN.

Koreshan Leader's Body Still Lies in State Despite Widow's Protests.

ESTERO, Fla., Dec. 26.—Victoria Gratia, accepted leader of the Koreshan movement, arrived to-day from Washington, where she was at the time of the death of Dr. Cyrus Teed, which occurred last Tues-The body of the founder of movement is still held in state, following a ceremonial at midnight Christmas night, when it is alleged the spirit arose. It is still asserted that the clay will again resume animation.

When told on her arrival that the body being held the new ruler of cult displayed much displeasure and ordered it immediately interred. There was some objections on the part of the assembly triumphant, backed up by the collegiate system. Yesterday the county authorities of Lee County, in which Estero is located, made a demand that the body be interred at once. to interfere.

Victoria Gratia has derided the idea that the inanimate clay of Dr. Teed will again become animated.
