

## WILL PUSH THE PROSECUTION OF TEED.

### Normal Park Citizens Will Help Cole Pay for His Suit Against Koresh.

William C. Shaw, the leader of the anti-Teed movement, said at a meeting in Thornton Hall, Normal Park, last night: "I am told that there are 100 witnesses to be subpoenaed who will show that Teed has violated the laws of God and man. In the case of Cole versus Teed Mr. Cole should not be called on to pay the expenses of the trial. If the citizens of Normal Park can help by raising \$200, and be rid of Teed, it will be a splendid investment." The meeting appointed the following committee to raise the money: W. P. Saunders, Robert Lipsey, and W. P. Keeler. A collection of \$28 was taken in the hall and the rest of the \$200 will be raised by subscription.

The meeting adopted the following report of the committee of twenty appointed by the citizens of Normal Park in the mass-meeting May 18 to devise ways and means to rid the community of Dr. Teed and his disciples:

Your committee has been assured by the State's Attorney, J. M. Longenecker, that he will render every assistance in his power to indict and prosecute Teed and any of his followers against whom criminal charges may be brought. Several eminent attorneys have been consulted concerning the doctrines and practices of said Teed and his associates, and from these attorneys the committee has the assurance that Teed can be held on several indictments, and that steps will be taken to that end immediately, and that the prospects are fair for said Teed's securing a permanent abode in Joliet. Your committee also reports that valuable assistance has been volunteered by many influential citizens to rid this community of Teed. Your committee recommends that no rash, violent, or unlawful means be employed, but that all proceedings against Teed be within the law.

It was also reported that Gen. John C. Black had offered his services in the prosecution of Teed.

The report was adopted and thereafter the following resolution was passed:

*Resolved*, That the committee be discharged, as a secret committee of 100 has been formed to push the prosecution of Teed.

After the meeting adjourned a crowd of 2,000 citizens gathered in front of Teed's "Sunshine Flats," but violent demonstrations, if they were planned, were prevented by the presence of a special detail of police.
