

by "Koresh" Teed has been granted. The "Sunlight" flats are now guarded by four bluecoats and two officers in citizens' clothes, and the inhabitants of "heaven" rest in security. There is a disposition among the members of the committee having the Teed matter in charge to rest quietly on its oars and await developments in the courts. State's Attorney Longenecker has promised the committee to take special charge of the investigation before the grand jury.

Teed is reported as saying that if the Normal Park people wanted him to leave and they would give him \$100,000 he would go at once. That fact was reported to Assessor Katzenberg yesterday, and he said: "I am in favor of assessing that property high. It is valuable and has a frontage of 600 feet. I must assess something in that neighborhood to make up for losses on non-taxable property. The Sunlight flats should be assessed at \$10,000 on real estate." Last year Katzenberg raised the assessment to \$5,000, resulting in a tax of \$493, and, since Teed thinks the property valuable, the amount may be doubled.

ARE STILL LOOKING FOR "KORESH."

Property Scheduled by His Bondsman Found Not to Be Satisfactory.

It was discovered yesterday that the bond given by Cyrus R. Teed, the Koreshan "deity," was insecure, owing to the fact that the realty scheduled by Cowing was not as represented. When Cowing became Teed's surety for \$2,500 bail he scheduled under oath property valued at \$17,500, incumbered \$6,000. It is claimed that upon looking the matter up in the Recorder's office it was found that part of the property belonged to Cowing of record and was incumbered by tax deeds. The rest of the property was recorded last to F. C. Giddings. When this was found out Constable Eicke was sent to Normal Park to arrest Teed, but he was not found yesterday afternoon. It is declared that Cowing will be prosecuted.
